EMMAKEYS FLAT TOP GRILL IS UNDER NEW MANAGEMENT

James Whack and Gene Bordinger had both been working the grill at Emma Keys for about 18 months when Emmett Morphis put the restaurant up for sale last year.

Whack, who had spent 16 years at Fisher's Grille, had just settled into the groove at Emma Keys and in the Lindley Park neighborhood. Bordinger, new to the restaurant business but a longtime resident of Elam Avenue, says he felt like he had found a new connection to his neighbors — "making people happy one burger at a time."

Both men knew the restaurant had a good thing going and together they started dreaming of all the things they could do if they were in charge. In February they bought Emma Keys and started making those dreams come true.

While Whack and Bordinger have kept the core menu of burgers, fries and hot dogs, they've made some fun changes.

Whack's wife, Tracy, helped put together a daily breakfast menu. Scratch-made Belgian waffles (sweet or savory), omelettes and breakfast sandwiches make for inexpensive morning options in the \$4 to \$6 range.

Mondays are education discount days, when you get 20 percent off meals with a student or teacher ID. Tuesday nights will feature live music on the patio and 99-cent kid meals. On Wednesdays, all craft beers are \$2.75. Every Saturday, Whack does an outdoor fish fry that starts at 10 a.m. and goes until the food is gone. The menu includes whiting filets and catfish nugget plates (\$8) or sandwiches (\$5).

As always, the restaurant is kid friendly and dog friendly, and it offers vegetarian, vegan and gluten-free options. Thanks to James and Gene for keeping a good thing going in Lindley Park!

PROJECT UPDATES

Big Ideas for 2016 and Beyond

Here are some of the initiatives that are in the works here in Lindley Park. Jump on board one of these or suggest your own.

Tree survey: Neighbors! We would like to begin our tree survey in the park off of South Lindell Road. Do you know how to tell a tree from a bush? Can you help hold a tape measure around the trunk of a tree? Excellent! You're hired! Join us **May 21** from 9 to 11 a.m. as we begin the process of documenting the current trees in the park. The first draft will be low tech with pencil drawings of the tree locations, measurement between trees and of tree girths and basic identification. Living map: As we approach Lindley Park's centennial, it's a great time to look to the past as well as the future. A living map allows us to collect artifacts (photographs, written and spoken memories, etc.) and layer them on a map to show where they occurred and how our neighborhood has changed over time. We will have events to share and grow our maps as we create them as a community. We've applied for grant funding from the Building Stronger Neighborhoods Foundation and have a team from Guilford College involved to help lead the project. PARTICIPATORY BUDGETING 5

VOTE FOR LINDLEY PARK ON APRIL 11 & APRIL 20!

The Lindley Park neighborhood stands to gain big from the initial round of Participatory Budgeting in Greensboro. The city allocated \$100,000 to each council district in Greensboro (we are in District 4) and asked the public to decide how to best spend the money in their district. Neighbors acting as budget delegates have been working on proposals that will improve our quality of life in Lindley Park.

Here are the five projects the Lindley Park Neighborhood Association is endorsing:

- **Raise the Bridge**: Make the Walker Avenue bridge safer for pedestrians crossing Wendover Avenue by replacing the bridge railing with a taller and more aesthetically pleasing design.
- Paint the Path on Walker Avenue Bridge: Improve the safety of the pedestrian walkways on the Walker Avenue bridge by adding markings to clearly show drivers that there are walkways on both sides. Paint the curb edges with high visibility paint and stain the walkways in an aesthetically pleasing manner. Also add an edge line to the roadway to encourage drivers to allow additional space for cyclists on the blind hill.
- Walkway on Spring Garden at Howard Street: Provide a safer path for pedestrians at the busy restaurant-retail hub which includes Hops, Scrambled, Fat Dogs and Barberitos. Create a high visibility, handicap-accessible pedestrian crosswalk with improved lighting at each of the four junctions of the intersection.
- Walkway on Elam Avenue at Camden Road: Provide a safer path for families near the Lindley Elementary School. Proposal includes a four way crossing and small cement island similar to the crossing found at Walker Avenue and Northridge Street.
- **Shade cloth at Lindley Pool**: Enhance our neighborhood pool with the addition of shade cloths to provide respite from the sun. Proposal offers flexible options such as partially covering the toddler area as well as providing shade for other pool patrons.

There are two chances to vote on District 4 proposals: **Monday, April 11** at the Kathleen Clay Edwards Library 1420 Price Park Drive, from noon to 4 p.m.; and **Wednesday, April 20** at Lindley Recreation Center, 2907 Springwood Drive, from 4 to 8 p.m. Voting is open to all residents of District 4 (which includes Lindley Park) ages 14 and up. 
"I love our neighborhood and the Corner Market for me is the icing on the cake!"

10 COLLEGE HILL COOP

College Hill Childcare Co-operative isn't just a day care center. It's an intentional community of like-minded parents and teachers who believe that children thrive on fresh air, ample playtime and loving care. Co-op was created by parents who wanted to be active participants in their children's care. While Co-op started in the College Hill neighborhood in 1981, it has made its home in Lindley Park since 2005. For 11 years, Co-op's children paraded through the streets on Halloween and the Fourth of July and frolicked on one of the school's three playgrounds. But as of March 31, Co-op no longer has a home in Lindley Park.

While the building at Spring Garden and Scott Avenue has been on the market for the past two years, the Co-op community got just 30 days' notice to leave the space to make way for a new, for-profit day care center. Faced with the daunting task of relocating an entire day care center in a month, parents and teachers quickly came together to create a plan to ensure Co-op's future. They worked around the clock to pack up and move everything from furniture to toys to refrigerators into storage. They pored over classifieds and cold-called churches in search of a new home.

While the search for new space continues, Co-op families are committed to continue working together to preserve their community and provide excellent child care. While Co-op has successfully raised money to cover moving expenses, Co-op will need more money to secure a suitable new space. North Carolina has strict licensing requirements for child care centers, and the new space likely will need work to bring it up to code.





WIG-WOMEN IMPACTING GREENSBORO

You might have heard about the group of 100+ women who meet quarterly to support nonprofits in our community. 

What's the story on the Board of Adjustments sign on Walker Avenue?

The owners want to list the house as a family care facility to support both of the young men who live with them. The young men have lived there for two years but under state law the owners cannot provide at-home-care for one of the men unless it's listed as a group home. LPNA has talked to the homeowner and supports the family's application. Laura Collins and other neighbors will support the request for a new hearing that will include adding some conditions, such as limiting the change to use by only the current owners so this isn't a permanent use change.

What is the plan for repaving Walker Avenue?

In late summer or early fall the city plans to repave Walker Avenue from South Lindell to Aycock. At the same time they are marking the road with "sharrows." These shared lane markings are not a separate bike lane but are a reminder to car drivers to share the road. We've asked the city to extend the sharrows along all of Walker to West Market Street, as many of our neighbors live across the Wendover Avenue bridge.

What is the latest on with the property at Holden and Walker?

The proposed developer recently accepted a high counter offer made by the last several uncommitted homeowners. The developer now has a six-month due diligence period to finalize contracts and seek rezoning. The developer has not yet approached the city's planning department. If the developer moves forward, we hope LPNA will have a chance to give input on building placement, driveways, building heights, exterior lots and other elements. Unfortunately, the area is not included in the neighborhood plan so we have fewer tools to get the developer to work with us before the project gets moving.

What is happening with The School at Spring Garden?

The owner wants to convert some existing four-bedroom apartments into one- and two-bedroom units. Amanda Williams, one of the owners, says they plan to have more apartment units but actually fewer beds and therefore fewer renters. The owners want to rent to more graduate students and young professionals. The city is requiring them to rezone and, more importantly from our perspective, alter the Lindley Park Neighborhood Plan. However, the apartment owners do not plan to change the building's exterior or expand the existing footprint. The only changes will be made within the walls. LPNA will work with the owners to find why the city is requiring the neighborhood plan change. Since the plan is a good tool to ensure that changes are thought through in more detail, the LPNA is very resistant to changing it.

What are the rules about chickens and other livestock in Lindley Park?

As a local farmer I've had time to peruse our regulations about livestock on more than a few occasions. Now that spring is here, here's a quick note about bees and chickens. To have bees and chickens you have to have a lot size that is a minimum of 7,000 square feet (0.16 acres), which should include most Lindley Park properties. Coops and bees must be at least 25 feet from the property line and 50 feet from a house. They must be at the rear of the house. There is a maximum of 10 bee colonies if they are 25 feet of the property line, or 20 if they are more than 50 feet. You can have a maximum of 20 chickens. Loud animals more than six months are allowed, so you can't have roosters a-crowing. Happy urban farming!
