

Committee Reports

Environmental: There was a heating oil spill at a vacant lot on Springwood when an underground oil tank was breached during construction. City and environmental workers responded and put down baffles to keep oil from going in creek. Tank was emptied and will be removed along with contaminated soil. City has a 24-hour spill hotline (336.373.2793). A Water Resources representative will be invited to next general meeting to provide more details and give out flyers.

Park workdays, now scheduled first Saturday of every month, need more help. Contact Elizabeth Link at <u>beautification@lindleyparknc.com</u> to volunteer to adopt a section of the park, take on tasks such as cleaning trash out of the creek, or assist with redoing landscaping at corner of Lindell and Walker.

Communications: New communications group has met twice since organizing in May about social media, email, newsletter, and the website.

Zoning/Development: Active committee members are working with developers and Guilford County Schools.



Nearby industrial facilities include an asphalt plant on Holden, Sherwin Williams on Oakland, and Vertellus on Gate City, which manufactures DEET, among other products. Depending on which way the wind is blowing and how they're conducting their operations, we may encounter smells from industrial operations near our neighborhood. If you smell any unpleasant odors, please contact Davis Murphy at 336.776.9644 and Ray Stewart at 336.776.9637. both with NCDEQ Air Quality Division. If it's after hours, please call and leave a message. Squeaky wheel....

We have had several instances when foam or discoloration has been seen in the creek in the park, which may be due to spills from Sherwin Williams or other industrial operations on the south side of Spring Garden. If you see anything unusual in the creek, call the City of Greensboro Water Resources 24-hour industrial spill hotline at 336.373.2793.

What Makes Lindley Park Special?

Lindley Park is special for a lot of reasons. I've lived in three different houses since 1992, so there's been a lot of special here for me, and there are many neighbors who have lived here decades longer than that. It's the people who make it special.

Our neighborhood is unique in Greensboro, a vibrant area with lots of commercial and residential growth. Many people move here because they value that. Keeping up with that has always been important and has become more important as growth increases.

We also have a lot going on within the neighborhood, usually six or more social events each year. Some have become long-standing traditions like the Chili Cook-Off and the Annual Yard Sale, and some are newer like the Oyster Roast. But all are a lot of fun and have generated great friendships and memories.

Everyone who lives in the neighborhood is a member of the Lindley Park Neighborhood Association (LPNA), whether you own or rent, or donate to the association. Members are represented by the LPNA Board, but only a small group of people serve on the Board at any given time. So how does all this stuff get done?

Over the years, there have been many people who have served on the Board and made significant contributions. We can't name them all, but a few who stepped down recently deserve a special shout-out!

Bill and Patti Eckard stepped away at the end of last year after actively being on the Board for 25 years. Among other roles, Bill has been Board Chair, the Zoning and Community Liaison, and coordinated Public Safety; Patti has served as Treasurer, Secretary, and Vice Chair of the Board. Together they have spearheaded National Night Out and the annual lighting of the luminaries and have edited and distributed newsletters. Thank you, Patti and Bill, for your dedication to making Lindley Park special.

Jessica Beamon was editor and designer of the newsletter for over six years and created and managed the LindleyParkNC.com website since its inception in 2014. She has basically been the one-woman neighborhood social media manager across all platforms since 2012, and in her spare time, coordinated the Chili Cook-Off for three years. Jessica created a robust foundation for communications that is providing a solid structure for the current Communications team. Thank you, Jessica, for your creativity and technical skills, we couldn't have done it without you.

The LPNA Board has committees/working groups in place to manage events and monitor development, environmental issues, park upkeep, and other potential impacts on the residents of Lindley Park. Each committee has an appointed or elected chair, who is responsible for bringing together a group to fulfill the responsibilities outlined by the By-Laws and Board.

It can be difficult to recruit people, so often the same people stay in the same roles for many years. The Board is working hard to change that. New people bring new ideas and new energy. Getting more people involved helps us all to feel more engaged in our neighborhood. In the past few months we've put a greater focus on reaching out and are excited to recognize some of the people who have stepped up to make a difference in our neighborhood.

First let's give a round of applause to Carrie Little and Robin Anders for their recruiting efforts. We now have broad representation from throughout the neighborhood for development and zoning groups, the communications committee, and a group that will be working to update the 20-year-old Lindley Park Neighborhood Plan, which helps guide development in and around the neighborhood. And we have new event coordinators for the fun stuff. We'd like to recognize the folks who have volunteered, with apologies if we miss a few as these groups are still evolving.



"Pre-cycling" Tips

From the Environmental Defense Fund

Pre-cycle by making buying choices that support responsible products and packaging, make recycling easier, and reduce the amount of garbage you throw away.

- Shop with reusable bags.
- Buy large single containers the largest you can store—and measure what you need into smaller reusable containers for everyday use.
- Pass on Styrofoam. Choose cardboard egg cartons, which are made from recycled newsprint. For paper boxes (such as cereal boxes) the rule of thumb is: If the unprinted side is gray and not white, it's made from recycled materials.
- Compare the size of the package to the size of the product.
- Buy fruits and vegetables loose.



Every month we'll feature a business that, while not "officially" within the LP boundaries, serves our neighborhood well.

This month:

The UNC Greensboro Emeritus Society lifelong learning program provides noncredit opportunities for adult learners of all ages. Approximately 25 courses are offered annually with topics including Arts, Music & Culture; History; Literature; Religion & Philosophy; Sciences & Technology; Current Events; and more! Instructors are a mix of professors, current and retired, from UNCG and nearby universities, graduate students, independent scholars, and community experts.

Emeritus Society courses are about the love of learning. The college-level courses are designed to encourage and support pursuit of intellectual interests without the pressure of tests and grades. Courses typically meet once per week for 75-90 minutes over a three- to six-week period; class times vary but are typically during business hours. Costs range from \$80-\$160 with several offered for free.

This fall the program offers 13 courses and lectures taught by outstanding instructors, including Lindley Park's own Monica Scovell (Sherwood Street), who will take students on Un Grand Tour: France and Its Regions, a cultural tour of the major regions in France. Some of the other courses being offered this fall include Beatlemania-The History of the Fab Four; Well Crafted NC: Beer and Brewing in the Triad; and The Search for Intelligent Life in the *Universe*.
