Notes from LPNA Board Meeting

October 24, 2023

Treasury Report:

Current Balance \$5.231.00 — Made almost \$2.000 from T-shirt sales

Old Business

NeighborWoods: Date has changed to November 18. Gboro Beautiful has signed up 200+ volunteers to plant trees. They have asked Lindley park residents to help sign in the planters, assign them locations, etc. Contact: RobinAnders -robinsuttonanders@gmail.com

LPNA or neighbor donations needed to provide some snacks and drinks, suggested \$150 as amount to spend. Discussed purchase of large drink coolers but may already have some.

New Business

Lindley Elementary Construction: Discussed that neighbors have asked what LPNA stance is on complete tear down vs support for keeping the original facade if possible. There was support for teardown, as building is not in good condition, but also for keeping the façade if possible. GCS has not submitted plans and no conclusion was reached – will discuss at next board meeting when we have had a chance to get more info and more input from the neighborhood.

Committee Reports

Environmental: Elizabeth Link – discussed park work days, see below. Also discussed the missing solar lights on the Walker Ave. bridge. Result of vandalism, and City is looking at possible options, but haven't come up with anything so far, as this was done through Participatory Budgeting, and the lights are outside of what City normally uses or maintains.

Communications: Steve Eury – newsletter – would like to get help in rounding up new advertisers. Also may need to go back to giving some copies to advertisers so that they are kept up with events and also with how their ads & listings are.

Gov't/Community Liaison: An update from the Kellin Foundation: Kellin has received notification/ confirmation from contractors that construction will begin on Monday, October 23. We will start with replacing the roof, removing the steeple, and upgrading a section of the building for use. Additional interior renovations will begin soon as well to ensure the building is up to code. Staff will be more present onsite and some services (on a very small scale) will begin, although most services will be in other locations still. We look forward to supporting the building with the needed renovations and continuing to contribute to the health and wellness of the community.

Yard Waste and Loose Leaf Collection Changes 2024

The City of Greensboro will make changes to yard waste and loose leaf collection beginning March 2024. More information can be found at https://www.greensboro-nc.gov/departments/field-operations/yard-waste-changes-2024.

- •February 2024: The 2023-24 leaf collection will end. This will be the last time the City will use vacuum trucks to collect leaves roadside.
- •Beginning March 1, 2024: Residents must use only biodegradable paper bags for yard waste. No plastic bags will be accepted. The City will collect up to 10 bags per household per week. At this time, the City will no longer collect personal yard waste bins/carts.
- •Beginning Summer 2024: Customers will receive a City-provided, 95-gallon, gray rolling cart for leaves and yard waste. The cart will be collected weekly on residents' regular collection day. A second cart may be purchased at a later date.
- •November 1, 2024: Leaf season begins. The City will now accept up to 15 biodegradable paper bags per household per week in addition to leaves in the 95-gallon cart.
- •February 2025: Leaf season ends after the second week in February.

 Bag limit reduces to 10 per week per household. The City though will continue to collect the 95-gallon yard waste bin that may include leaves.



Urban Gardening: Lightning Bugs and Leaves

When I first moved to Greensboro, I remember summer nights looking out my back windows at trees covered in the flashing of fireflies. Since then I, like many people, have noticed fewer fireflies in my backyard. Maybe it's simply nostalgia for time past making these beetles seem less obvious or less numerous than we remember, but other reasons are related to how we garden here in the US.

I first thought it was mainly due to an increased use of herbicides and pesticides, but most of my neighbours and I largely avoid such products and have allowed wild areas to grow along our fence lines. Recently I've learned it's more likely influenced by something many of us do without thinking, cleaning up our yards. Life cycles of fireflies and other insects rely on leaf litter. Females lay eggs in undisturbed damp soil and piles of leaves, which are harder to find when we tidy up. I don't send my leaves off to be composted, but I often rake them up to put in the chicken run or shred them with the mower to put around plants. In the process, I not only removed habitats, but destroyed eggs.

As I write, I can hear a leaf blower prepping leaves in someone's backyard to be bagged and sent somewhere else. Perhaps then that person will buy a bag of compost to put on their plants. This year I'm going to be less tidy, or perhaps, according to some of my neighbours, even messier than usual, and leave the leaf mulch where it is as an experiment to see what will happen to the insect population in my yard. I hope this will encourage a slow rebound in fireflies over the next two to three years, and also be less work for me. less noise for my neighbours, and put more nutrients back into the soil.

NeighborWoods a Rousing Success

As you've moseyed around the neighborhood in the last few weeks, you likely passed Lindley Park's newest residents. On Saturday, Nov. 18, hundreds of native trees—from white and red oaks to dogwoods and magnolias—were planted by neighbors and volunteers from across the community.

The trees, which are now growing strong in front lawns, neighborhood parks, and Lindley Elementary School, were a gift from Greensboro Beautiful's NeighborWoods program, which is funded by public and private sponsors and is committed to replacing the native tree canopy in neighborhoods across the city where old trees have been lost to storms, disease, and age.



Now THAT is a tree-planting crew!

At Lindley Elementary School, students and their parents planted 30 trees around the periphery of the playground, and lining Northridge and Camden Streets. Neighborwoods' Keith Francies showed the children how to dig a shallow planting hole so the roots could access oxygen; he helped them loosen the roots from the root ball; he demonstrated how to straighten the tree and gently fill the hole. Then he moved on to another part of the neighborhood to help a group of college students, who made up a majority of the planting volunteers.



"Is this the most efficient way to plant two hundred trees?" laughs Francies. "Probably not. But this is about more than planting trees. It's about community engagement and education. And in particular, it's about getting young people involved."

Francies and Randal Romie are volunteers and co-chairs of Greens-boro's Urban Forestry committee. For years, they've stood at the helm of NeighborWoods' annual planting day, often staying until dark—and coming back the following days to visit residences, make sure people got the trees they requested, and ensure everybody knows how to keep their new native plants healthy.

"They're like silent giants," says Romie of Greensboro's native trees. "They're part of the framework of the landscape. We don't necessarily see them, but we know they're there."

Romie and Francies are happy to dedicate the hours of service and education. They just have one request: "Don't forget to water."

Lindley Elementary School Construction Plan

At their December 12 meeting, the Guilford County Board of Education (BOE) authorized Guilford County Schools (GCS) to proceed with an architectural and engineering contract to design a new campus for Lindley Elementary School, During the programming and planning phase of the contract (2-3 months), the consultants will determine how to best meet the district's safety and education requirements, conduct additional community engagement with stakeholders, and evaluate feasibility of reconstruction and preservation of all or part of the school's original 1928 structure. GCS will consider a variety of factors, including cost and timing, before making a recommendation to the BOE. They anticipate going out to bid on construction in approximately 12 months with the goal being to reopen Lindley in August of 2026. Depending on the direction taken, students could be temporarily relocated for the 2025-2026 school year, but a final timetable cannot be set until the consultants have done their analyses and provided options for GCS to consider.

Members of the LPNA Executive Board have attended several meetings with GCS staff, BOE representatives Michael Logan and Alan Sherouse, and Lindley School parents and teachers. It is clear that we all share the desire to provide first-class facilities for the students of Lindley. A lot of discussion has centered on whether preserving the original structure will make it difficult to achieve that end. Whether the original structure can be preserved is a complicated technical and economic decision with pros and cons on both sides. The LPNA board will continue to gather residents' thoughts about the project and its potential impact in order to best represent the interests of the neighborhood. 



The former Mock, Judson, Voehringer Hosiery Mill, also known as the MoJud Hosiery Company, is set to reopen as luxury apartments in December 2023, as we go to press. Many of us remember the building in the block bounded by Hiatt St., Howard St., Oakland Ave. and S. Lindell Rd. as the Rolane Factory Outlet Store, which survived the 1972 plant shutdown until 1999 when it closed as well. The mill building, which was built between 1927 and 1938, was added to the National Register of Historic Places in March 2011. 
