City Council District Change For Lindley Park

An email to LPNA from Sandy Carmany indicates that if the annexation of the Cardinal is approved, as it likely will be, it will cause voting precincts 14 and 15 to be moved into District 5.

At this time about half of Lindley Park is in District 5 and half is in District 4. The change would bring all of Lindley Park and most of Sunset Hills into District 5. This will be beneficial to LP.

Federal law requires that all city council districts be within 10% of each other in population. With the proposed annexation of the Cardinal adding 9000 + residents to District 4. Some shifting of precincts out of District 4 would be necessary to accommodate this requirement.





LINDLEY PARK LUMANARIES DECEMBER 15



Toxic Holidays

Its 4 o'clock in the afternoon on Dec 25, wrapping paper and toys are strewn everywhere, the kids are chasing the dog around the house because he just ate a Christmas ornament, and the cat is now vomiting tinsel. You will be spending the rest of your Holiday at the emergency clinic and, little do you know, you will be waiting in line while the dog that ate 4 lbs of chocolate and the cat that decided the liquid potpourri looked like a nice bowl of warm milk are seen first.

Some emergencies are completely unforeseeable and unpreventable, but there are some things that you can do to prevent that late night trip. Rather than boarding your pets or forcing them to wear a basket muzzle all season long, take some time to look around the house. Also, be aware of what is potentially dangerous and know the signs to watch for if something does happen. Some items can be extremely toxic and can send a dog or cat into organ failure while others may simply cause profuse, yet highly disturbing, drooling (picture your rabid-looking cat with drool rivaling that seen in Turner and Hooch).

Here is a list of things to be aware of during the season.

PLANTS WITH VERY LOW TOXIC POTENTIAL: Poinsettia, Mistletoe, Holly, Christmas trees, and Christmas cacti – These (especially Poinsettias) are highly misunderstood plants. Ingestion rarely causes signs more significant than profuse drooling. Can cause mild, self-limiting vomiting and diarrhea, but rarely requires any medical attention.

HIGHLY TOXIC PLANTS: Lilies- including Easter lilies, tiger lilies, Oriental lilies and day lilies – Can cause severe kidney failure and death in cats, even with the smallest exposure. Vomiting and lethargy usually develops within several hours and they can rapidly deteriorate.

CHOCOLATE: Though it can require large quantities, chocolate and cocoa powder (and also cocoa bark mulch used in gardens) can cause hyperactivity, vomiting, diarrhea, hypertension, seizures, and even death. Don't indulge your dog's sweet tooth!

XYLITOL SWEETENER: One of the newer artificial sweeteners contained in some chewing gums, toothpastes, puddings and some baked goods. It can cause severe hypoglycemia and liver problems with even a very low exposure. So far, it appears that dogs are the only animals sensitive to these effects. If your dog ingests the sweetener or a product containing this sweetener, contact your veterinarian or take them to the emergency clinic before clinical signs develop.

LEFTOVERS: A small piece of lean turkey is typically fine for an otherwise healthy pet; however, pancreatitis and

LINDLEY PARK AND THE NEIGHBORHOOD CONSERVATION OVERLAY

A few year ago we as a neighborhood and the city of Greensboro created, revised and implemented a neighborhood plan for Lindley Park. Within that plan are several projects that the neighborhood has and are putting into action. One of them is the Neighborhood Conservation Overlay. We are currently in talks with the city to implement this next part of our plan. Following are several frequently asked questions about the NCO. What is a neighborhood conservation overlay district?

A Neighborhood Conservation Overlay (NCO) district is a zoning layer placed on top of the base zoning district that serves to protect unique features of a residential neighborhood. The zoning overlay is tailor-made to each neighborhood and reflects the special qualities of that place. It protects elements visible from the public right-of-way and may vary from setbacks and building massing to distinct architectural features to special natural or environmental characteristics. An NCO also serves to facilitate compatible development or redevelopment.

What changes will happen when a neighborhood becomes a conservation district?

The purpose of an NCO is to maintain the existing setting and features of a neighborhood that give it its special character. A property owner will not have to change or alter the property due to the designation. If the owner does want to alter the property and the proposed changes are addressed in the neighborhood design guidelines, plans will be reviewed by City staff to ensure that any alterations are compatible with the existing neighborhood guidelines.

Who will decide how the guidelines will affect my property?

Residents within the overlay district determine what is included in the guidelines. The neighborhood creates its own design guidelines and conservation plan with the help of City staff. The City serves to help property owners comply with the neighborhood's goals.

How can an NCO help a neighborhood?

One of the goals of an NCO district is to stabilize and enhance neighborhood character by providing a clear plan and set of design guidelines that accurately reflect the neighborhood as a cohesive unit. By establishing a higher standard of development, NCOs typically stabilize property values and encourage quality new development and reinvestment in the area. Increased neighborhood pride, resident involvement, and a greater sense of community often result from this recognition as a unique and special place.

Will being an NCO make me change the appearance of my property or rehabilitate it right now?

No. Property owners are not required to alter their properties upon designation. If, however, an owner wishes to alter property after designation, the owner would be required to follow any applicable NCO guidelines.

What sorts of things can the guidelines regulate?

Items such as, but not limited to: building height, massing, and orientation, principal elevation features, fenestration, building materials, roofline and pitch, dimensional requirements, setbacks, lot size, floor area ratio, parking and loading requirements, garage entrance location, driveways, landscaping, fences and walls, lighting, signage, general site planning for both primary and accessory structures.

What sorts of things can the guidelines not regulate?

Interior alterations, routine maintenance or repair of any structure or site feature, demolition of any structure, exterior paint colors and types of land uses permitted by the underlying zoning district.

Can an NCO be used to exclude certain types of housing?

No. An NCO is used to maintain the character, setting and identity of a neighborhood and to promote quality, respectful investment. If a parcel is currently zoned for multi-family, an NCO will not change that current land use.

Tylenol can send them into respiratory distress. Another thing to be aware of, cats, for some unknown reason, have an affinity for the taste of the anti-depressant **Effexor**. So whether the holidays have you reaching for the pain meds or the anti-depressants, make sure everything is out of reach of your pets and do not give anything to your pet without consulting your veterinarian first.


LIQUID POTPOURRI: Cats may lick or get the liquid on their fur. This can cause irritation and ulceration of the skin and the GI tract. Do NOT induce vomiting. Offer a small amount of milk for dilution and take your cat to the emergency clinic for continued care.


GRAPES AND RAISINS: Okay, maybe not a typical holiday treat, but many are not aware that grapes and raisins are toxic to dogs. Only a small amount of grapes can lead to vomiting within a few hours and kidney failure can develop within hours or days. If your dog ingests grapes or raisins, early treatment is important to prevent kidney failure from developing.

TINSEL AND ORNAMENTS: How (or why) a dog will chew and swallow a glass ornament is beyond me. The tree can be an inviting new toy for cats and dogs alike. Be sure to place the tree in a location where they only have access while supervised (use baby gates in the doorways if needed), don't use tinsel, and place ornaments higher on the tree.

For more information, visit www.aspca.org. There is also an **Animal Poison Control Hotline** (888-426-4435) that is staffed by veterinarians and toxicologists 24-7 365 days per year. The one-time consultation fee of \$55 per case allows you and your veterinarian access to the specialists for the entire time your pet is sick.

The holidays are a wonderful time to spend time with family and friends- including those of the four-legged variety. I hope yours is a safe and wonderful one!




Fall Fun in the Park

DON'T SPREAD LEAD IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD

Greensboro has wonderful neighborhoods with older homes contributing tremendous character to our community and providing very special places to live. But older homes often have lead based paints under the more recent layers of paint and that means that renovations and maintenance usually disturbs the paint, releasing the lead dust into the air and onto floors, yards, and children's toys. The more that all of us can do to get older homes repaired, the more likely that people can be unintentionally exposing children to the risk of lead poisoning if they don't know about lead. Lead Safe Work Practices are techniques to control the lead dust in paint preparation or other repair projects. Greensboro Housing Coalition is making these packets available when property owners or contractors apply for renovation or repair-to-standard permits on homes built before 1978.

You can protect your family, neighbors, and tenants from lead hazards by letting others know: **DON'T SPREAD LEAD**.

- 1) Become familiar with lead safe work practices through reviewing a short booklet and video called: "Don't Spread Lead," so that you can recognize the safe and unsafe ways to handle surfaces painted with lead paint. Call 691-9521 to receive a DVD or watch the video on the Internet at http://douglassarpy.unl.edu/eh/indoor lead.shtml.
- 2) If you are doing the work yourself, take the steps shown in the video, using plastic, duct tape, spray bottle, safety glasses, masks, gloves, and shoe covers. We will soon have a HEPA vacuum cleaner to check out -- just like borrowing a book. Greensboro Housing Coalition will offer free clearance testing to check for residual lead dust after you have thoroughly cleaned up from working on the home.
- 3) If you are selecting painters or repair workers to work on your home or rental properties, ask them about how they handle lead paint risks. If they are not aware of the preparation and clean-up steps in "Don't Spread Lead" materials, encourage them to study the video and booklet or look for another contractor. Guilford County Health Department also provides one-day classes in Lead Safe Work Practices; call 641-3771 for schedules.



- 4) Discuss Lead Safe Practices in your neighborhood association meetings if there are older homes in your neighborhood so that other homeowners and rental property owners will be safe; lead dust can easily blow from one house to another, contaminating *your* home too.
- 5)Tell neighbors about "Don't Spread Lead" information packets if they are considering repainting older homes or doing extensive renovations. Call Greensboro Housing Coalition and we can provide one to your neighbors if they have not received one with their building permit.

Young children are at special risk of lead poisoning because of their developmental stage, so Guilford County Health Department provides free blood tests to children under 6: no appointments are needed at 1100 E. Wendover Ave. When the lead level in their blood indicates that they are at risk, the Health Department checks every source of possible exposure to lead dust. such as their homes, places they play outside, and day care centers. Lead poisoning can cause life-long learning and behavior problems as well as other health disorders. Don't spread lead - no one wants to hurt a child.
