VALENTINES FOR THE NEWCOMERS SCHOOL

Our family usually isn't big on Valentine's Day — celebrating with maybe a card and a little chocolate — but this year my wife, Julia Ridley Smith, decided to do something different.

Her idea came from a high school friend who posted on Facebook that each year she and her neighbors in New York City have a Valentine-making party. They get their kids together and make a bunch of cards to deliver as a surprise to people in their community. When Julia saw another high school friend comment about it on Facebook, she got an idea.

That second friend is a teacher at the Doris Henderson Newcomers School. This public school in Greensboro serves

students in grades 3-12 who are new arrivals to Guilford County. Many are refugees who have fled repression in their home countries. Many arrive here after long stays in refugee camps. All are learning to speak English. Most students stay at the school for a year to improve their fluency in English before transitioning to other schools across the county.

At a time when many immigrants and refugees are feeling less welcome in the United States, Julia wanted to send them a message: "We're glad you're here in our community." So she decided to organize her friends and neighbors to make 420 Valentines — one for each student at the school.

With only a week and a half before Feb. 14, Julia sent out a message to friends in Lindley Park and across Greensboro. Markers, construction paper, googly eyes, doilies, and amazing star- and heart-shaped paper punches started piling up at our house. A dozen adults and kids came over one afternoon and together made more than 100 cards. Other folks made Valentines at the Corner Market, at home and at Super Bowl parties.

Julia never thought that getting so many Valentines made so quickly would be a problem: "I have so many big-hearted friends. I knew they would be excited about the idea and would get it done." She was right. In the end, we had more than 460 beautiful handmade cards!

On the morning of Valentine's Day, we rode over to the school, together with Jonah Newsom, Theo Perkins and Reuben Akins. We gave cards and candy to students from Laos, Sudan, Guatemala, Iraq, Syria, Rwanda, Eritrea and dozens of other countries. Many of the students didn't know much about the holiday, but they were attracted by the colorful cards. The candy, of course, needed no explanation!

"Go ahead, take one," we told them. "These are for you. They say that we're glad you're here in Greensboro." Some students asked to take 2 or 3 so they could give them to their mothers and siblings. Over and over, the students thanked us with with words and smiles.

A great surprise for us was that some of them had made cards to share with us. Like the cards our friends and their children had made, the newcomers' Valentine's expressed love and friendship in many languages.

These kids need a lot of support, and a Valentine and a piece of candy was only a small and simple gesture. But hopefully that gesture represented something bigger, a message of hope and welcome. For those of us who made the cards, as well as for those who received them, it was a reminder that we are all one human community.




COMMUNITY PITCHES IN ONCAMPUS UPGRADES

FAIR-WEATHER FEATHERED FRIENDS

As a bird nerd, I look forward with great anticipation to this time of year — the last couple of weeks of March and the month of April. This is when birds who've spent the winter months in warmer climates migrate back north to their summer breeding grounds.

Some of these birds didn't go very far — birds such as the Common Grackle, Osprey, and Eastern Phoebe will move to the coastal plain or down to states further south of us. These are usually some of the first arrivals, and have already returned to the area.

Many others have traveled all the way down to South America and the Caribbean to spend the winter and will pass briefly through the area as they make their way back up to the mountains, northern states and Canada to their summer homes. Many of these are tiny birds, not much bigger than a Chickadee, with bright coloring and intricate songs. Many of these birds will have traveled thousands of miles by the time they get to Greensboro. There's only a month or so each spring that we have the opportunity to

see them, but they can turn up in Lindley Park, in the Arboretum or in your backyard.

This is also the time of year when some birds that spent the winter here return to higher altitudes or latitudes for the winter. This includes the White-throated Sparrow, Ruby-crowned Kinglet and Golden-crowned Kinglet

Then there are the birds that spent winter in the southern hemisphere and are returning to our area to spend the summer. Birds such as the Gray Catbird, Ruby-throated Hummingbird, House Wren, and Wood Thrush will soon be arriving back in our neighborhood to find a place to build their nests and raise their young.

They'll be looking for birdhouses (the House Wren) or a thick row of shrubs (the Catbird) or tall tree to build their nests. They'll also need food for themselves and their young, and the best source of nutrition for them is insects. It takes hundreds of bugs and caterpillars to raise one bird from a hatchling to an adult. Even the Hummingbirds eat bugs. Hummingbirds also eat nectar, of course, and you can attract them with blooming flowers that are trumpet-shaped, such as Salvia species (sage) and our red native coral honeysuckle. The Catbird and Wood Thrush also like berries and fruit, including the berries of holly trees, mulberry trees, American beautyberry and blackberries. Catbirds also like my cherry tomatoes, so I just plant an extra one for them!



If you're interested in learning more about birds, both our local species and the colorful migrants, there are many good books and phone apps to help with identification. Among these, "The Sibley Guide to Birds" is a very useful book. It's also available as a phone app that has color drawings of the birds, descriptions, range maps, and recordings of the songs of each bird. "The Crossley ID Guide" is in book form, and has photo montages of each bird, showing it from different angles and distances. The local Piedmont Bird Club has a web site, piedmontbirdclub.org, which contains information about bird sightings, field trips, workshops for beginning birders, resources on the web and other useful information. So keep an eye and an ear out and you may begin to see and hear some of these tiny creatures that make this amazing journey every year.

NEW ARRIVALS INSTITUTE

Maybe you've noticed a colorful group of folks walking from the bus stop along West Market Street to Peace United Methodist Church. Maybe like me you've wondered what's going on at the church with the rocking chair bunny out front.

Recently I saw that the New Arrivals Institute wanted neighborhood input on an upcoming outdoor community space they are developing at West Market and North Lindell. I thought I'd check it out, so I met with Lynn Thompson, NAI's community engagement director. Here's what I learned.

The New Arrivals Institute is a state-funded nonprofit that rents space from the church. It works with GTCC and other agencies to offer classes and support to refugees for the first five years or so that they are in Greensboro. In 2016, NAI served 740 people. Currently it serves an average of 130 people at the church daily.

Most NAI clients are refugee families who have fled their own countries because of a well-founded fear of persecution for political, religious or other reasons. Many have spent a year or more in refugee camps. They undergo a strenuous vetting process before coming to the United States.

Most refugees who end up in Greensboro come through Church World Services or African Services Coalition. The newcomers get just three months of help from the resettlement agencies in finding a place to live and schools for their children and arranging medical care and transportation. Many speak little or no English.

This is where NAI comes in. Its mission is to help refugees become self-sufficient through education. GTCC instructors teach English and NAI instructors teach employment readiness classes. The Cone Health Congregational Nurses program provides health services. NAI also provides some case management services, free childcare for caregivers learning English, free bus tickets for those who need them, an ethnic food pantry, a computer lab, after-school tutoring, summer enrichment for refugee kids, and, of course, the community garden.

An important step to self-sufficiency is for refugees to develop relationships within their community. "It takes more than one agency, or congregation or family to create a welcoming community for refugees. It takes many folks working together in small and large ways," Lynn says. "This is one of the reasons we are so excited about the development of Growing Peace: Community and Children's Outdoor Learning Space."

The goal of the outdoor space, Growing Peace, is community interaction. The space will be a park-like setting where community members can enjoy, play, and maybe volunteer. A landscape architect is drawing up plans for trees, an edible garden, environmentally friendly play area, outdoor classroom, meditation area and more.

You can get involved now. You can assist an English instructor or employment readiness classes. You can help children with their homework. You can volunteer with the summer camp program for children or help organize a fundraiser or donation drive. Anyone over the age of 16 can volunteer. Time spent counts toward Guilford County Schools' service learning requirements.

Feel free to get creative. Last year Grimsley freshman Leah Brown organized a Party with a Purpose to build a library of books for the NAI's preschool clients. Leah and her friends donated 80 new and used books.



Teddi Says "Chow" to Arthritis

Stem cells are the body's own healing cells which transform and replace damaged or injured tissues. After receiving concentrated stem cell injections intravenously and in each affected joint, Teddi now enjoys her walks and playtime again. She is off all NSAIDS and pain medications. Over 900 million stem cells are cryo-banked for future use. Now Teddi feels so young that she tells everyone she is only 5.
