# Tree Trimming & Removal Practices

Duke Energy's tree-trimming practices continue to make news by being a heated topic for Greensboro City Council and concerned citizens.

The Dec. 18 meeting of the Greensboro City Council marked a turning point in the Duke Energy tree controversy where residents demanded en masse that the Greensboro City Council take action against Duke.

The City Council meeting held on Tuesday, Jan. 15, high-lighted the continued importance of this issue to Greensboro residents. A standing-room only crowd of over 100 people attended to voice their desire to stop Duke Energy's current tree cutting program. The overall message from numerous speakers and those in attendance was "Stop cutting down our trees," not "Make sure you tell us before you cut down the trees."

Then on Thursday, Feb. 7, Duke Energy held a "community workshop" in the Lindley Park recreation center. This workshop was about clearing trees around transmission lines which was scheduled to begin mid-February. Unfortunately, there was no opportunity for resident groups to question Duke Energy personnel. Many Lindley Park and Westerwood neighbors expressed disappointment over the meeting format which is used to try to keep opposition to a project from coalescing.

The conversation continues on March 4 at the meeting of the City's Tree Ordinance Review committee. The committee was created by City Council in January and consists of four city council members (Nancy Vaughan, chair, Marikay Abuzuaiter, Yvonne Johnson and Nancy Hoffman).





## Lindley Park Home Sales in 2012

Over the last 12 years, I've tracked home sales in Lindley Park, Last year proved to be more challenging than expected. While we sold more houses in 2012, and the average square footage was more and days on market was less, our average list price and closed price went down. In my opinion, several key factors attributed to this outcome. Foreclosures took their toll with 8 houses selling much lower than normal market value. Several homes in need of renovations or repairs were sold "as is" which brought down prices. More one level ranch style homes with more square footage came on the market in 2012, causing the "supply and demand" theory to come into play.

But – lower sale prices also turned into a plus for some young families. They were able to purchase in Lindley Park and are currently renovating their new homes. Several foreclosures were snapped up by contractors willing to bet money and resources on the neighborhood and that their projects will attract buyers and that their newly renovated houses will sell at much higher prices.

The outcome in Greensboro, on average, was that houses stayed on the market longer, prospective sellers had to do more to attract buyers and had to tighten up their list prices. In our own 27403 zip code – which includes Sunset Hills, 143 houses sold. The average price was \$158,802. The sale price percentage to list price was 93.2%. Days on market (DOM) was 119.9 days.

Home sale activity for 2013 is getting off to an even slower start than usual. Inventory is low with only 11 houses on the market. Some are carryovers from 2012. Period homes, i.e. Bungalows, Tudor or Cape Cod styles – so very popular with buyers are limited at this time. But, with spring just around the corner – we will be moving into our busiest timeframe for selling. Spring is traditionally when more buyers start searching. So, if you are thinking about putting your house on the market – use this slower time wisely. Get your house ready. Consider a pre-listing home inspection to make sure your home does not have any hidden problems. Freshen up the inside with paint. Clean out closets, attics of unwanted or needed items. Work on your curb appeal. Most importantly, be realistic about your expectations. Regarding timeframe to get your house ready – it always takes longer than you will think. And when it comes to pricing – remember, we are still in a buyer's market and they can afford to wait and be choosey.

Lindley Park will always continue to be a sought after destination for many prospective homeowners. Besides the obvious – tree lined streets, the Park, sidewalks, walking distance to restaurants, stores and an elementary school, we truly do have a sense of community in our neighborhood. When out walking, folks stop to talk with their neighbors. Residents keep a watchful eye and sound the alert over suspicious activity.

## **UNCG Neighborhood Consortium**

UNC-Greensboro established a Neighborhood Consortium several years ago in and attempt to keep the lines of communications open between itself and nearby residents. The group includes representatives from the university, neighborhoods and merchants. UNCG is expected to continue expanding in coming years to accommodate enrollment growth, and this consortium will play a key role in keeping the lines of communication about that growth open.

Neighborhoods involved in the group include College Hill, College Park, Greater Glenwood, Lindley Park, Mayflower, Sunset Hills and Westerwood, in additional to local merchants.

On January 4th, the group met and discussed several construction projects that are underway along the Lee St. corridor as UNCG reaches into the Gleenwood neighborhood. These include the "New Spartan Village", the new Student Rec. Center, the new central campus police station and the pedestrian underpass. The underpass will connect the campus to Lee St's new development allowing students to walk under the railroad tracks.

There was also some discussion about "off-campus" student housing (rentals) and their impact to the surrounding neighborhoods. All were aware of the on-going challenge to handle yard / shoulder parking, trash, deferred maintenance and noise complaints. The group was told to have concerned neighbors call the City Contact Center at 373-CITY. If an photo is appropriate to the complaint, it can be sent through an email link from their web site. ## Daylight Savings Time Begins March 10th

It is that time of year again! On Sunday, March 10, turn your clocks forward one hour to begin Daylight Savings Time.

According to Wikipedia: Daylight saving time—also summer time in several countries in British English, and European official terminology is the practice of advancing clocks so that evenings have more daylight and mornings have less. Typically clocks are adjusted forward one hour near the start of spring and are adjusted backward in autumn.

The modern idea of daylight saving was first proposed in 1895 by George Vernon Hudson and it was first implemented during the First World War. Many countries have used it at various times since then.

The practice has been both praised and criticized. Adding daylight to evenings benefits retailing, sports, and other activities that exploit sunlight after working hours but can cause problems for evening entertainment and other occupations tied to the sun. Although an early goal of DST was to reduce evening usage of incandescent lighting, modern heating and cooling usage patterns differ greatly, and research about how DST currently affects energy use is limited or contradictory.

Also, don't forget to change your smoke alarm batteries if they are more than one year old. Don't have working smoke alarms? Contact the Greensboro Fire Department at 574-4088 for free equipment and installation.






