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

"Blood Brothers" by Willy Russell: September 25-October 11


"Blithe Spirit" by Noel Coward: November 6-22

This sounded like such a good idea that maybe Lindley Park Church can organize for next year. And if I know Jack Almon - they will!



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
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


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SUMMARY OF GREENSBORO'S NEW NOISE ORDINANCE

(Code of Ordinances 18-48 to18.58.1 - Adopted by City Council 11/5/07) - provided by Greensboro Neighborhood Congress

The New Ordinance Creates Three Categories of Regulation of Noise:

First, prohibits noise that is "unreasonably loud or disturbing." (18-49)

Depends on: - Noise level

- Noise duration and/or recurrence

- Ti me of day

- Location of noise (nearby residences, zoning)

(Subjective test based on "normal peace and calm" for person of "ordinary sensibilities")

Second, prohibits certain "noise producing activities" deemed illegal per se (18-50):

- 1) Horns/whistles/bells (except for legitimate safety use)
- 2) Electronics/instruments stereo, TV, etc. at level disturbing to residences **
- 3) Car stereos audible more than 30 feet from vehicle
- 4) Frequent/long/continued pet noise **
- 5) Unnecessarily loud motor vehicles (e.g. no muffler) **
- 6) Construction from 6:00pm to 7:00am in a residential area (10pm 7am elsewhere) (Provisions allowing some level of subjective interpretation marked with a "**")

Third, prohibits activity causing noise over certain levels at nearest residential property (18-51)

Daytime:

70 decibels from 7:00am to 10:00pm

Niahtime:

65 decibels from 10:00pm to 7:00 am

(These are objective measurable standards based on use of a sound meter)

OTHER FEATURES:

Amplified non-commercial free speech cannot be audible more than 150 feet from source (18-53)

Exceptions (18-54) - the ordinance does not apply to noise from:

- 1) Emergency response work, including by public and private utilities
- 2) Construction work on public streets
- 3) Activities of state or federal government, or public or private schools (but not fraternities)
- 4) Non-amplified crowd noises from activities of churches
- 5) Activities between 7am and midnight at entertainment venues with capacity of 7,000+ persons
- 6) Emergency warning devices
- 7) Bells, chimes, or calls to services at religious buildings
- 8) Licensed fireworks displays from noon to 10pm (except may be until midnight on July)
- 9) Decibel limits (18-51 only apply to noise in the downtown business district from 2am to 7am

ENFORCEMENT

- 1) Responsibility lies with police officers "shall" issue citation for any violation (no discretion)
- 2) Police Department is to designate a "noise enforcement officer" to oversee enforcement
- 3) Penalties are \$200 for 1st violation in a year; \$400 for 2nd, \$500 for 3rd and beyond (18-58)
- 4) Generally a citation will issue, but arrest allowed if violator does not cease when cited
- 5) Warnings to be given only if violator had noise satisfactorily pre-tested by police
- 6) In addition to occupant, <u>property owner_(landlord) will also be cited</u> if present or has verified written notice (via hand-delivery or certified mail) of other violations in last year (via hand-delivery or certified mail) of other violations in last year (18-58.1)

Those Pesky Little Buggers

Fleas. Everyone who has pets knows the enemy I speak of. We have been battling them for as long as we have had pets in domestication. They torment our cats and dogs, they annoy and disgust us, and they spread disease... everything from tapeworms to the bubonic plague that killed over 75 million in the 1300s.

Of course, our first and foremost concern with fleas is the incessant itching and scratching that goes along with them. The most common skin disease in dogs and cats is flea allergy dermatitis. Many pets are so sensitive to fleas that it takes only one flea jumping on them for a few minutes to make them scratch all night or cause a hotspot. The scratching can lead to serious skin infections and the feasting of the fleas can even cause lifethreatening anemia. You would think that something preventable would be less common, but the difficulty lies in the fact that prevention isn't always an easy task.

To understand the products, we need to understand the life cycle of the flea. The adult flea drops eggs in batches of about 20 at a time. The eggs fall from the pet's hair coat into the carpet and environment. The larvae hatch and then spin cocoons. The cocoons are resistant to freezing and insecticides and can persist in the environment for many months- hence the random flea outbreaks in the winter. The adult flea emerges from the cocoon in response to vibrations, warming and increased CO2- ie whenever a warm body is near. The flea can feast on our pet's blood within hours of emerging from the cocoon, ready to start the cycle anew. All of this can happen in just 16 days!!!

In all actuality, the adult fleas that we see are only 5% of the actual flea population in your house and yard. The other 95% are eggs, larvae, and pupae waiting to hatch and repopulate. Most adults do not survive for more than 72 hours on an animal, but during its lifetime, adult fleas often lay up to 600 eggs! With most flea infestations, you rarely see the fleas themselves. It is best to pay attention for the evidence of fleas- biting and chewing (especially at the sides and lower back near the tail and hindquarters), tapeworms (these are the ones that look like grains of rice in the stool), and dark specs, or "flea dirt", in the pet's coat. A flea comb can be purchased at any pet

store and is very useful to identify fleas and the flea dirt, especially on those dark-haired dogs!


Just 15 years ago our flea control arsenal was limited to sprays, bombs, powders and shampoos. They smelled horrible, worked for only a limited amount of time, and washed off easily. Even worse, many caused serious adverse reactions, especially in cats. Since their introduction to the market, these products have been improved upon to an extent, but at the same time the fleas have become more resistant to them. They still wash off easily and most have no effect on the eggs and pupae which is 65% of the actual flea population. These products are available today as the overthe-counter products found in pet stores such as **Hartz, Adams, Biospot, Defend, and Zodiac,** but they have been joined by numerous other, more effective products available from your veterinarian.

The newer flea preventatives derived from different chemicals began with **Advantage** and **Frontline** in 1996 which revolutionized flea control. They are extremely safe, came in a feline version, and have little to no resistance. Since then, many products, including many over-the-counter ones, have added additional chemicals called **IGRs**- insect growth regulators such as **methoprene**, **lufenuron** and the newer, **Nylar**. This is a birth control for fleas that helps to break the life cycle by targeting the egg stage as well (ie much more effective on the entire flea population).

Companies continue to produce more effective products and additional modes of delivery to give owners as many options as possible. Sentinel is a chewable product, and Advantage Multi and Revolution are topical products that combine flea prevention with your monthly heartworm preventative. Capstar is a pill that is extremely fast-acting to kill all of the adult fleas on an animal within hours- it is an excellent product to use in combination with other treatments and can be extremely helpful if an animal has a flea allergy. For dogs that are frequently bathed or swim often, there is a new pill, Comfortis, which provides month-long flea prevention. For those who are concerned about chemicals and the environment this may be your best option as it is derived from a naturally occurring bacteria and even received the Presidential Green Chemistry Award for its development. However, Comfortis has no effect on ticks, so additional products may be required depending on your dog's lifestyle. Vectra 3D is another new

product on the market which is excellent at controlling fleas, ticks, and mosquitos. It is a topical that has an easier applicator to use than Frontline and so far seems to be just as effective if not more so.

Because of the large selection of products available with different benefits and uses, I encourage you to talk to your veterinarian to find out which product is going to be best for your pet. I am constantly asked why I recommend a product such as Frontline or Vectra 3D which costs \$13-15 per application when you can get Hartz at Wal-Mart for just \$20 for 3 applications. Well, if an over-the-counter product is working for you, great- you are a select few! However, if you are still seeing fleas or flea dirt or if you have a pet that has a flea allergy, the additional cost will be worth it. Usually, the client asking why they should pay more for a veterinarian-provided flea product is also the client coming to see me because their dog has a skin infection due to fleas- the cost of a good flea preventative from the start would have been far cheaper than paying to treat the infections!

Regardless of the products used, it is important to remember the life cycle and treat all stages. For every 10 fleas on your pet there can be 200 waiting to emerge! All pets (including indoor-only ones) are hosts to fleas- so be sure everyone is treated and protected!

When instituting a flea control program in your home, the basics still apply:

- -vacuum and immediately dispose of the vacuum bag to rid the environment of the eggs and larva
 - - wash all pet bedding and replace any outdoor bedding
 - - brush your pet frequently with a flea comb and check for evidence of fleas
 - - talk to your neighbors and make sure everyone is protected! This is a community-wide event!
