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UNCG UPDATE...

UNCG continues to seek neighborhood input into their growth plans. The UNCG contact person is Mike Byers, Vice Chancellor for Auxiliary Services.

As you all know UNCG is looking at property between Oakland Ave. and Spring Garden St. for development of athletic fields. They have some funding and would like to begin buying land.

Mike Byers indicated that the University needs 7 acres to begin and would eventually grow into 20 acres. This acreage would not front Spring Garden St. They are looking at the large industrial lots farther east and south.

UNCG met with the Glenwood neighborhood as well as the City Planners, both have welcomed UNCG expansion across Lee St. UNCG would like to know if Lindley Park would welcome expansion in the indicated Lindley Park area. Would we?

LPNA Chair Susan Taaffe, Ex Officio Stacy Ryan' and Public Works Chairperson Elizabeth Link met with City Planning staffers, Mary Sertell and Heidi Galanti regarding our Neighborhood Plan and the fact that it does not include development by UNCG. The City stated that if we were to welcome UNCG and their recreation field project we would need to amend Neighborhood Plan because, UNCG and the rec fields are a deviation. Other recommendations from the City include Conditional Zoning (must keep the trees, facilities required to be brick ect.)

A motion was passed at the Jan 29th General Meeting that we form a task force to continue to meet with UNCG and report back to the neighborhood. However, Susan needs neighborhood input to help create the best plan of action. Email her at susantaaffe@bellsouth.net and let her know your thoughts.

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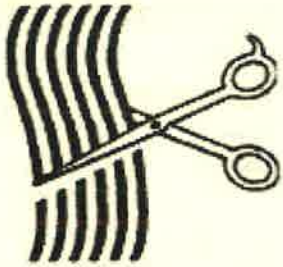

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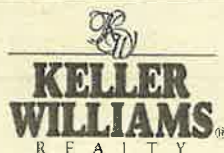


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HOMES SALES IN LINDELY PARK STAY STRONG IN 2007

During a year when most areas of the country experienced a slow down in sales and plummeting prices, Lindley Park home sales not only stayed strong but increased in the average dollar amount for closed prices on homes and decreased in the number of "days on market" (DOM). Prices ranged from \$109,900 (or \$131 per SF) for an 840 SF house with 2 bedrooms and 1 bath (no garage) to \$219,000 (or \$128 per SF) for a 1762SF house with 3 bedrooms, 2 ½ baths, no garage (but a separate heated structure was on the property). Of equal importance - home sellers were able to get 97% of their list price. While the data for 2007 shows a lower average for the \$ amount for Closed Price per Square Foot (CP/SF), the average size of a sold home in Lindley Park increased. Don't forget -- the smaller the house, the more expensive it is per square foot.

As you can see from the table below, I've been tracking home sales in our neighborhood for the last 7 years. I am always amazed at how far we've come in home values in such a relatively short amount of time. The table provides averages on square footage, and list price vs. closed price. The most important columns to look at are the Average Square Foot (AVER SF) and the Closed Prices per Square Foot (CP/SF). These two sets of figures tell you, on average, how much a buyer is willing to pay, per square foot, for a house in our neighborhood.

During 4th quarter of 2007, home sales in general, faced an even stronger challenge. Not only did it get harder for a buyer to qualify for a mortgage, but the houses under contract faced tougher appraisals from the lenders. Out of curiosity, I wanted to see what impact this new challenge had on home sales in our neighborhood. Of the 39 houses that sold in Lindley Park last year, 10 sold in the 4th quarter at 95% of the list price. Considering this time of year is the slowest for home sales, and the added mortgage crisis - Lindley Park held its own.

Each year as I write my annual home sales article for the newsletter, I take a moment to reflect on why our neighborhood is so special and why we are now one of the most sought after neighborhoods in Greensboro. Of course, as a Realtor®, I am quick to site the period architecture, sidewalks, parks, neighborhood schools and the close proximity to shopping. But, if you stop and think about it, Lindley Park is so much more. It's a sense of belonging, feeling part of a community. and a commitment to preserving our neighborhood -- all of which - increases our home values and desirability as a neighborhood. Recognition and appreciation needs to be extended to the Lindley Park Neighborhood Association (LPNA) - a group of tireless volunteer residents who believe strongly in preserving the quality of life and work in Lindley Park. From social gatherings, monitoring re-zoning requests, Spring Garden bike lanes and traffic slow downs on Walker Ave. to creation of a newsletter and website to keep residents informed, the LPNA is an integral part of Lindley Park and provides an intangible amount of value to the neighborhood. So, if you want to help maintain or increase the value of your home, you may want to consider getting actively involved.

It all just fell together. It didn't happen overnight; nothing truly memorable ever does, but when the pieces began to fall into place it seemed so right...and so natural...and so perfect. Lindley Park Baptist Church had been looking for a new way of giving back to the community. Crosslove Theatre was looking for a home. In the fall of 2007 it began and we are just beginning to see the impact it's going to have.

Crosslove's founder and director, Mike Gilbert, had a vision. He wanted to not only do theatre - he wanted to do Christian theatre, something that was truly unique in Greensboro. A mass letter directed to every church in Guilford County found its way onto the desk of Scott Orr, pastor of Lindley Park Baptist Church. "I don't remember the exact wording of the letter," recalls Orr, "but I remember being impressed with Gilbert's vision and wanted to find out more." So he called Gilbert and invited him to have lunch. As the two ate their sub sandwiches a bond was formed.

Orr had high hopes from the beginning. "Mike had the theatre, but needed a place to perform. We had the space and we wanted something to do in our newly renovated space directly below the sanctuary. It seemed like a match made in heaven."

The first show was a simple production, "We Three Kings," which featured four kids from the church and delighted audiences every performance. Shows that followed grew in size and audience appreciation. Gilbert explained, "We weren't just doing pageants. We were doing honest-to-goodness theatre. There were real sets, not just bathrobes. We had professional lighting. We rehearsed intensively for weeks to put the very best product on the stage that we could... and that's the way it will always be."

One big addition to this year's agenda is the first annual Crosslove Theatre Children's Theatre camp. Children ages 9-14 are invited to take part in the groundbreaking event. "It's a 3 week camp," explains Gilbert. "While some theatre companies take the "week-by-week approach, Crosslove Theatre feels it builds better relationships if students journey towards a performance project together over 3 weeks, while taking classes that build their knowledge of the theatre and the crafts therein. What makes this camp so unique is that Crosslove Theatre, a Christian-based theatre company, also engages the students in a bible study every day. We feel that bible study helps the student grown in Christ and helps that student become a well rounded individual."

The camp will run from June 30 through July 18. Classes will be held each day, except the 4th of July, from 8:30-5:30. At the end of the 3 week camp a presentation of C.S.Lewis' *The Magician's Nephew* will be performed by the participants in the camp. That show will be open to the public on Friday, the 18th, through Sunday, the 20th. For more information, contact the church at 226-292-5761.

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Redistricting...

The City is going to annex several square miles in the northwest quadrant of Guilford County. The Cardinal is one area that will be annexed. This addition of increased population will require, by federal law, a redistribution of City Council districts.

There are 12 plans proposed and can be viewed on the Cities website. (greensboro-nc.gov) Click on

Government and the City Council link and look for redistricting Options.

The goal of any successful redistricting plan is to cause the least amount of disruption in the process. The City staff compiled plans B,C,D,F, and H. The redistricting change in these plans for District 5 (our District) involves a range of only 2 -4 precincts.

Trudy Wade, District 5 Rep. proposed 4 plans, J,L,M, and N. Her plans involve from 17 -37 precinct changes. In all but plan N Lindley Park precinct 48 is moved out of District 5. Precinct 48 went for Sandy Carmony in the election. The word gerrymander comes to mind.

Redistricting is an important issue for our neighborhood and you are encouraged to go to the website and look at the plans. Plan B looks pretty good.
