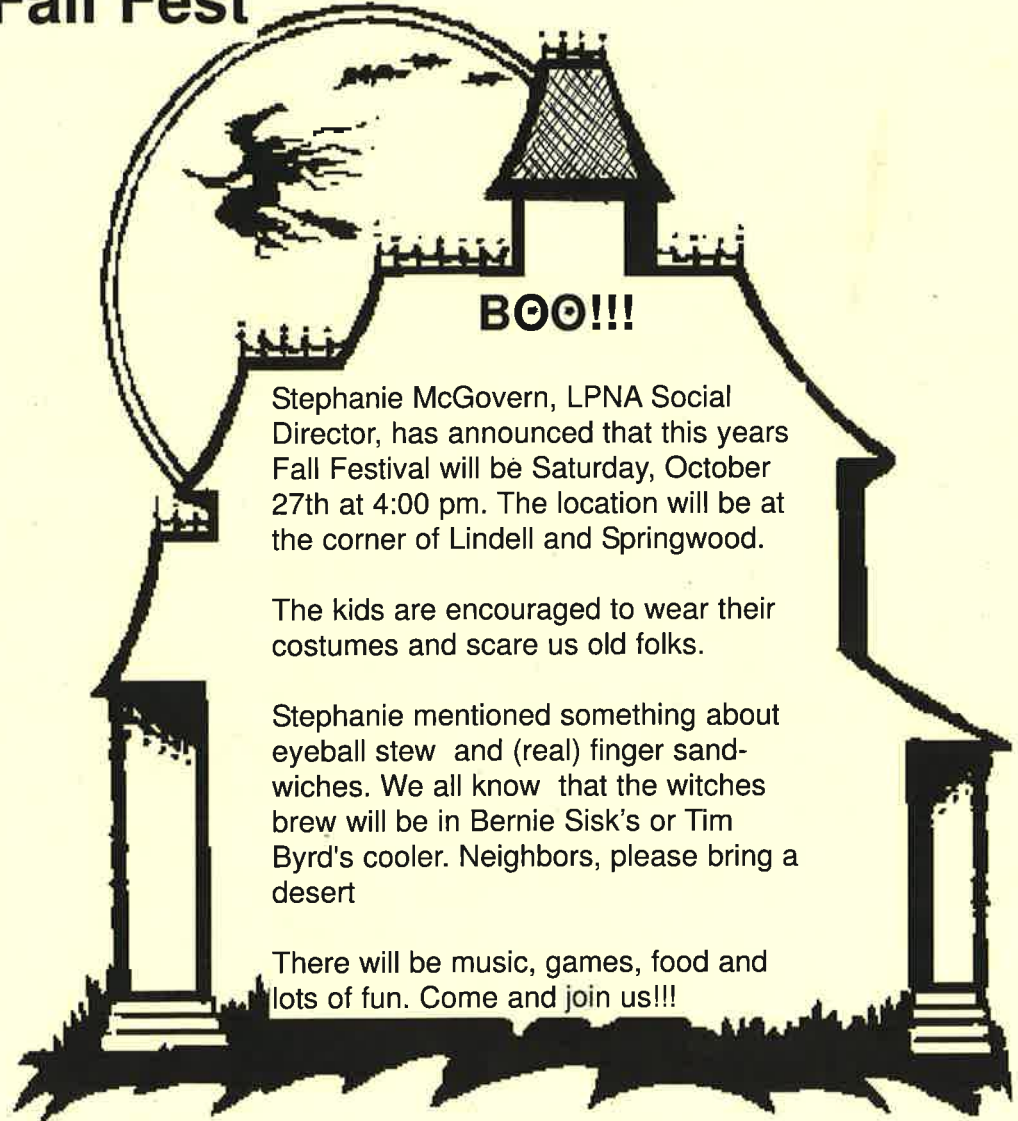

There's No Place Like Home

Unlike Dorothy in the Wizard of OZ it took more than a click of the heels for Mary Ann Boshers - Nelson - Murray to return to Longview St. The name Boshers is synonymous with Lindley Park. It all began with Papa Boshers; he worked for J Lindley Nursery. Papa Boshers built a large two story house on property that he purchased from Lindley. It had a large veranda, columns, and wide steps and was located at 703 Longview Street. Papa had 10 children. Five with his first wife then after she passed away Papa remarried and produced five more. The eldest boy from the second six was Wilbur Boshers, Mary Ann's father.

Wilbur Boshers moved to Lindley Park as a young boy and spent most of his life here. Wilbur married and in 1936 built a two story Tudor style home on property next to Papa Boshers house (701 Longview) Wilbur and his wife Mary, had four children. They are Wilbur Jr, Don, Jerry, and MaryAnn. Don and Wilbur Jr. still live in Greensboro. Jerry is deceased.

If you are old enough and have lived here long enough you may remember Boshers Grocery, opened in 1939 and located on Walker Ave. where Wahoo's is now. Above the store was Elam Beauty Shop, operated by Sara Boshers, Wilbur's sister. Boshers Grocery's other neighbors were Raynor Barber Shop, the Pickwick, and Elam Drug Store, complete with the soda fountain. Across Walker and Elam were Austin Texaco and Esso Service. Boshers Grocery was an old fashioned home delivery business. The delivery truck, with its canvas flaps that would roll down and protect the peach baskets when it rained, was a familiar sight throughout Sunset Hills and Lindley Park. The store closed in 1968.

Mary Ann was born at Wesley Long Hospital when it was located on Elm St. Wilbur and Mary brought her home to 701 Longview where she would grow up. She remembers the neighbors - Stanleys, Fosters, Popes, Byrums, Boggs, and the Scotts. Mary Ann fondly remembers the ice cream cooler at Boshers Grocery. (She still has it in her basement). Seeing her picture as a child she was a very pretty little girl and it is not hard to imagine her putting on skates, the kind you had to use a skate key to adjust, and skating down Beechwood St. to play on the same rocks in the creek that our kids play on now. She attended Lindley Elementary, Lindley Junior High and Grimsley High School. (Hers was the first class after the name change from Greensboro High School). After graduating in the 60's Mary Ann attended Merridith College in Raleigh

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Artstock Tour Comes to Lindley Park

On October 13th and 14th Artsock will celebrate its 10th Annual Artstock Studio Tour throughout the greater Greensboro area. Participating artists will be on site to display their visual art in studios, galleries, and other group locations where admission is free and open to the public. This unique event continues to grow each year, adding artists and locations to the tour. One location added this year is right here in Lindley Park. At 2410 Wright Avenue, artists Karen Evans and Joyce Corns will display an assortment of oil paintings, many of which have never been shown before.

The Artstock Tour began in 1998 and was developed by the Artists Support System Established Synergy group as a creative way to invite the public to experience the diverse talents of individual artists in our broader community. Works in oil, watercolor, pastel, pottery, wood, metal, and mixed media will be displayed at over 30 locations by over 80 different artists. This is a unique chance for collectors and patrons to acquire original works, talk with the artists, or simply enjoy viewing the creative talents of local artists.

Information is also available through the Marshall Gallery, TwoArtChicks, and through tour manager, Carolyn Owen (643-6428), who grew up right here in Lindley Park. Locations will be marked with the tour's signature *red balloons* and open Saturday 10am-5pm and Sunday 1-5pm. 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Greensboro Neighborhood Congress meeting notes

Saturday, September 8, 2007, 9-11 a.m. at the Greensboro Central Public Library

The meeting was called to order by Kathleen Sullivan and all attendees introduced themselves noting their neighborhood affiliations.

Russ Clegg of the City of Greensboro Planning Department, and Candace Burton of the City Parks and Recreation Department, shared details of how to apply for the annual Neighborhoods Small Projects grant program. Information and grant applications are available by contacting Russ Clegg at 373-2211 or at www.greensboro-nc.org/xxxxx. Applications are available September 31. Completed applications are due to the City October 31.

Greensboro's Housing & Community Development department administers this \$100K annual program, with implementation by City Parks & Recreation Department, all on City property. Examples of grant requests might be new trails, trash cans, medians, etc. A team evaluates applications, which then go before the Planning Board and City Council for approval. The team is recruiting two non-City employees. Grant chances are improved for projects that involve multiple-neighborhoods, multiple organizations, show clear neighborhood support, and those in which the neighborhood takes responsibility for any on-going support/maintenance. Projects for neighborhood signage may require the neighborhood to sign an encroachment agreement w/ the City Engineering Dept & Greensboro Dept. of Transportation, and Utility companies, as well as obtaining sign permits and building permits. Neighborhood street sign "toppers" may be available through the City for ~\$75/sign. Details will be available soon.

Donna Newton provided an update of Greensboro Bicentennial celebration plans. Events are year-long yet significant community-building events will focus on March 24-May 28, 2008. GNC members will receive forms to complete and return to solidify their participation plans. Some events are: a 4-day torch relay through many neighborhoods, downtown Heritage Festival, interfaith gathering, community dessert party at the Coliseum (April 26), parade (May 17), bicentennial book for sale, calendar, "history moments", a bicentennial website, archeological digs at Blandwood Mansion, a 3rd grade history curriculum, a future-focused science/technology expo, and ground-breaking for development of a downtown greenway loop.

Membership: Laura Jackson, Membership Chairperson, noted that Lamrockton neighborhood has submitted a membership request. Sam Petteway and others are creating a PowerPoint presentation to help neighbors implement an effective Neighborhood Watch program, with significant practical tips.

Finance: No report but no significant changes since August.

Upcoming meetings of interest to the GNC include:

September 29, 9:00 a.m. meeting for neighborhoods along the proposed City Greenway. Action Greensboro Offices, 317 S. Elm Street.

October 1, 6:30 p.m. meeting of neighborhoods in the 27406 zip code with Health Department officials, to discuss new health services in that zip code area.

October 18, 6:45 a.m. Mayoral Candidates Forum in the Nussbaum Room, Central Public Library, sponsored by the GNC.

October 22, 6:45 At Large City Council Candidates Forum in the Nussbaum Room, Central Public Library, sponsored by the GNC

November 10, 9-11 a.m., next regular meeting of the GNC, Nussbaum Room, Central Public Library. (Note: due to the above meetings w/ GNC involvement, the GNC will not hold their normal October meeting.)

Other business:

The High Point Road Lee Street Corridor plan will focus on three (3) streetscape plans for: 1) the interstate area, 2) the Coliseum area, and 3) the near-town area.

Laura Jackson reminded us that in order to get malfunctioning streetlights turned back on you should: 1) mark the street light post with a colored tag, 2) call Duke Power to report the exact location of the street light to be repaired, and 3) contact Kym Smith of the City of Greensboro kym.smith@greensboro-nc.org.

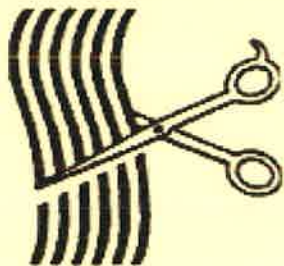
Dear Lindley Park neighbors

Time took its toll on Papa Boshers big house. The family grew up and moved on. The house was converted into apartments, one on the top floor and one on the bottom floor. It was the bottom apartment that influenced MaryAnn's life. There was a young man named Kenneth James Nelson that lived in the apartment with relatives. One afternoon when Mary Ann happened to be home alone, Ken came over to pay the rent. And as Mary Ann's friends put it, he kept paying for the rest of his life. Unfortunately, the old home place was sold and in the 60's torn down.

Mary Ann and Ken were married in 1965. Ken's career in the military took him and Mary Ann to Virginia Beach where they raised three kids. Her daughter Erin says she grew up on the coast and would always require the ocean in her life. But, according to MaryAnn, each trip Erin makes to Greensboro to visit softens her up. Mary Ann hopes her daughter will join her brother, Jimmy, who along with his wife Misty and their children are moving to Greensboro this month. Her other son Cliff and his wife Jennie live outside of Charleston with their baby boy.

In 2000, Ken passed away. In 2004 Mary Ann met David Murray, who's wife passed away in 1999 and in 2005 they were engaged. In February of 2005, Mary Ann and David came to Greensboro to help her brother Wilbur Jr. find an apartment. Wilbur Jr. was living in the house they grew up in at 701 Longview St. Because of the size of the house and other circumstances he wasn't able to keep the house maintained and it fell in to disrepair. The chimney was collapsing and water poured in from roof leaks when it rained. Another few years the house would have lost the fight and probably would have been demolished. Mary Ann approached her nephew and a cousin about renovating the house. They thought that it was too big a project and declined. Her son Cliff thought about it and called his mom and asked, "Why don't you renovate it"? Mary Ann said that was such a simple question and thought - "Why don't I"? She asked David and her son Jimmy and his wife Misty if they would move to Greensboro. Everyone agreed.

They started interviewing contractors, the ones that would call them back, but just didn't feel comfortable with the interviews. Then, through a word-of-mouth referral they found "Stephan Warberg" (Stephan doesn't advertise because he is that good). The before/after pictures that they took are incredible. Through the renovations they were able to save the banister, case molding, exterior brick, furniture, and many original items. The fireplace had to be completely restored. Through creative space design, Mary Ann's master suite has a huge walk-in closet. Imagine that. Space for their enlarged beautiful kitchen was added by a simple expansion of the back entry where a laundry room was also added. From the living room you can access the restored side porch. The renovations were completed in the spring/summer of 2006. David says that Mary Ann stalked him and kept asking him to marry her. In June 2006 he relented (somehow I don't think that is true). David, Mary Ann, and Davids 15 year old grandson, Jordan, moved into the lovingly restored house on Longview. Jordan is now 16 and is involved with Grimsley High football and the Fire Fighters Explorer club.

David is fond of telling a story about Mary Ann as a teenager. According to David, when a suit-or would begin to get too serious about her, she would take the young man down to the wooden bridge in the park and tell them that Kenneth James Nelson was the only one for her. David calls it "Heartbreak Bridge" and refuses to go anywhere near it. (You can still see the footings from that bridge along the bank of the creek).

When the movers started to move the picnic table into the living room, Mary Ann had to say stop and tell them the table goes in the back yard. When they asked - "where is that" she knew there would have to be close supervision. But, the move was successful and the Murray's are happily settled on Longview. David is reclaiming the large back yard and is creating an Arboretum like setting. Their house is wonderful and if you ever get the chance to see it, do.

It will be great to see Mary Ann's very pretty six year old granddaughter, Meghan, strap on skates and skate down to Lucy Newsom's house and then both go down to play on the rocks. MaryAnn has come full circle. She said that you can never really go home, time takes care of that, but you can create a home, after all there is no place like home!

The following is a brief summary of the cities schedule.

Primary Period of Celebration:

March 25 through May 17, 2008
During this period, the Bicentennial Commission will hold its sponsored events that will include: a Torch Relay on March 25th through the 28th followed by opening ceremonies, a Heritage Festival taking place on the weekend of April 12th, an Interfaith Service for all people on April 20th, a Community Gathering on April 26th at the Coliseum's Special Events Center tentatively starting at 6:30 PM, a Parade of Decades on May 17th, an archeological dig at Blandwood Mansion taking place the last two weeks of May through the first week of June, and a World of Tomorrow Expo that will feature multi-media exhibits and demonstrations revealing futuristic expectations for our city. Other groups, including neighborhoods, can hold Bicentennial themed activities throughout 2008 and may apply to the Bicentennial Commission to have these become "affiliated" Bicentennial activities.
